The Results are as follows: 470 Yes Votes 125 No Votes 595 Total Votes


The Declaration requires a minimum of 429 Yes votes for an amendment to pass. The Association exceeded that amount. Therefore, the Amendment change has passed.

Rentals must be for a minimum of three months consecutively and a maximum of six months consecutively within a twelve month period. All renters must go through the screening process.


# Valentine's Day Party

Most of us think that bullying is a childhood issue — one that fades into the past once we reach adulthood; however, seniors are victims of bullying, too. In fact, some reports show that seniors face bullying more often than children. Being aware of senior bullying can help caregivers address the issue.

#### Seniors are Targets of Bullies

Bullying encompasses cruel actions by a person who takes advantage of another's weakness. Some people see seniors as vulnerable and try to take advantage of that perceived weakness. As a result, seniors become victims of fraud and crime, or they may be treated harshly. Scare tactics and verbal intimidation cause the victim to feel exposed and powerless.

Seniors who live in over 55 communities and assisted living facilities or who have in-home health care may also become victims of bullying. They may become victims of other residents or caregivers who may bully them. Whether the bullying is physical or emotional, it is traumatic at any age.



#### **Reasons Some Seniors Become Bullies**

There is no definitive answer to this question. Some seniors are simply mean spirited and angry. Some seniors who do not welcome aging may become antagonistic toward others. The only way bullying can be prevented is to educate people on the ways it can occur and to encourage others to intervene. Look for signs of emotional distress that may be the result of bullying.

#### **Individuals Who Bully**

- Lack empathy
- Have few friends
- "Need" power and control
- Struggle with individual differences
- Use power and control at the expense of others
- Suffer from low self-esteem
- Are empowered by causing conflict, or by making others feel threatened, fearful, or hurt
- Gossip
- Display passive-aggressive behavior
- Manipulate emotions
- Are verbally or physically aggressive
- Have a superiority complex

Currently, a bill has been filed in the Florida House of Representatives - House Bill 123 - "Stand Up for Seniors Act". This bill would create a new law that appears to apply only to 55+ communities in Florida. It defines intimidation or harassment that causes a reasonable person to fear for his/her safety or property. The definition may include physical actions, including gestures, cyberbullying; oral, electronic, or written communication; or threatening for reporting of such acts. Over 55 community's harassment is defined as conduct that has the effect of substantially interfering with or disrupting a member's opportunities, peaceful enjoyment of his/her home, and common areas, or association benefits.

One recommendation of this proposed bill would require the over 55 community to adopt a policy prohibiting bullying and harassment. The document must be reviewed at least every three years to ensure that association members do not subject others to fear or intimidation, and will apply to all members.

This policy would need to include a definition of types of bullying/harassment, a procedure for reporting, a method for the investigation of reports, a list of disciplinary action/penalties, possibly requiring mediation, warnings for the first offence, anger management therapy, second offence fining, etc. At this writing, the proposed bill is in its infant stage.

Bullying is destructive and intimidating, and we have never been as exposed to bullies as we are on today's world stage. Perhaps we could become the model in this anti-bullying/antiharassment crusade by setting a good example in our own interactions at LCG.
